


Message from Our Rabbi

Change is Difficult

To say the least – change is difficult, nearly impossible at times. We humans are creatures of habit. What is more we need to romanticize the past. As if to say, “Ah, those were the good old days.” Our past is glamorized for any number of reasons; not least of which is we were, of course, younger. Things were new and exciting, and in most cases, being younger meant we were also healthier. Our past reminds us of a time when life was not yet revealed. As we get older, our dreams tend to fade into the reality that this is now our life. We come to grips with the realization that some of our earlier ambitions will forever go unfulfilled.

What is true for an individual is often true for a community. One of the portions of Scripture that we read is entitled “B’Shalach –to go or be sent,” illustrates this point; the People of Israel have been escorted out of Egypt by God. They have witnessed firsthand the ten plagues inflicted upon the Egyptians that eventually freed them from their captivity. While in the desert on their journey to freedom, to a new land, and a new beginning, they were protected by God with a “pillar of cloud” during the day and a “pillar of fire” at night. The rabbinic tradition has affectionately labeled them “Dor Midbar”– the generation of the desert – the generation that has witnessed God’s presence in the most intimate way imaginable, from the Exodus to Mt. Sinai and beyond. In spite of all that they have witnessed, the Israelites’ yearnings for life as they once knew it in the “fleshpots” of Egypt overpower them. The People comprised of a group of individuals cannot wait to return to their familiar, safe, enslaved lifestyle.

When the opportunity for change confronts the Israelites, a change that will only enhance their lives and national standing, they romanticize their past, as unbearable as it was, and they object to the change. So after having witnessed the most amazing miracles one could possibly imagine, the Israelites complain bitterly to Moses saying: “Were there no graves in Egypt that we were taken to die in the desert? What have you done to us by taking us out of Egypt?” At this point in the narrative one has to feel sorry for God. No matter what God does is insufficient. God’s human subjects constantly refuse to be swayed.

Some of us can identify with the reluctance to make changes. The unknown is a daunting proposition. It is easier for most of us to travel the familiar route through life. Slavery may be lousy, but at least our next meal was guaranteed. Honestly, with all our twenty-first century sensibilities, are we any different? We know how hard it is to change, because we see it in ourselves. Bad habits and destructive behavior constantly repeat themselves. Bad relationships continue because we enslave ourselves into thinking they will one day improve. Our work may be terribly stressful, even painful, but it pays the bills. Change is one of life’s constants. We, like our ancient forbearers, are caught between two inseparable tensions in life: constancy and change. The unknown of the future entices us while at the same time scares us.

The Midrash (the writings that interprets our texts) accurately points out that all new beginnings are difficult. The People of Israel are on their way to a new beginning. They, like us, resist change because change is painful. Is it not ironic that moving is considered one of the most stressful things a person or family can do. The Torah – Scripture – in its subtle way is teaching us that lesson. But it is also

teaching us that amid all the change endemic to life is God. That the creator of this changing world we inhabit is our only true constant. That was a difficult lesson learned by the generation of the desert. It is an equally difficult lesson learned by our own generation today.

As we get older, perhaps we should remember that change is necessary for continuation, not stagnation. If we stayed the same – well, there certainly would be no excitement or anticipation. So, now, more than ever, we need to adjust our thinking to accommodate all the change we can absorb – not run away from them as our ancestors tried to do. Don't say: "Why can't they – our children and grandchildren – be like us?" Do we really want that for them or do we want them to grow and develop into what they can be for themselves?

That is the lesson of growth and evolution Scripture endeavors to translate for us. And for sure, it is the path we should be involved with in these later years of our life. We connect because of comfort and we expand those relationships because, as Scripture reminds us, there is no future without change.

Remembrance: Chapel Memorial Plaques

There are times established for us to remember loved ones. It is a time to recount the good times and the bad times that were the sum total of their journey here on Earth. Our remembrance will ensure immortality for all whom we love and miss. The time I refer to is designated as Yahrzeits. We light a candle, think about what was, and hope that the flame that burns will remain with us for all time, even as it eventually extinguishes.

Life is like that candle as it illuminates the path to tomorrow. When the flame disappears there is no darkness. Rather, there is the continuing search for light – the light of eternal peace – the light of eternal reward – the light that leads to oneness with God.

Each person remembered came to us through the generosity of a loving God. Precious moments were shared and fond memories are the legacies we inherited. Each life was precious, filled with dreams and frustrations, hopes and despair.

Death helps us understand creation. We are born, we live, we learn, we endure, and then we are no more. But we are reborn again in a thought, a happening, and for sure, in the reward waiting for all of us.

We think of love and warmth, strength and stability. We think of voids that are left, but we are encouraged because we know that while we could no longer hold on, God has reached out to caress our pain.

We have the capacity to rekindle the flame of pleasant remembrances, of laughter and joyous occasions so that the memories of our loved ones will remain a blessing.

How? By erecting a Memorial Plaque in the lobby of the Chapel. It is our rendition of Yahrzeit Tablets that we are familiar with when participating our former respective congregations.

How fortunate we are to be able to enter the Chapel each time we have religious services or celebrations and gaze upon the names of our loved ones. How fortunate we are to be able to affix the names of the memories we hold in a place that will ensure their perpetuity.

Perhaps, as you receive a Yahrzeit reminder from the congregation, you would consider this act of goodness that will immortalize our ancestors. Additionally, it is a most blessed way of supporting our congregation as well.

Each new Memorial Tablet affixed to the Memorial Board will be dedicated at our Shabbat services.

Cantorial Notes: A Brief History of Women in the American Cantorate

The SLJC Sisterhood was kind enough to invite me to speak at their January meeting. A topic of interest to them was the history of women in the American Cantorate. What follows is a portion of the discussion I had with the sisterhood as I thought the whole congregation might enjoy the subject.

A Brief History of Women Cantors

Presented by Cantor Ronda Polesky for the SLJC Sisterhood, January 2018

The Yiddish American theater began gaining popularity at the end of the 19th century. During this time, Jewish women were starring in dramatic productions and singing Jewish songs that included liturgical music as well as popular music with a Jewish or spiritual significance. One such artist was Sophie Karp who introduced the newly composed “Eli, Eli” (My God, My God), which was written especially for her but gained such immense popularity that many other renowned singers performed this ballad. In the early twentieth century, Jewish women performers continued to gain prominence in musical and vaudeville productions by singing Yiddish folk songs and special prayers like “Kol Nidre” and Sabbath zemirot (melodies). We also began to see Jewish female composers arise at that time.



As Jewish women singers became more prominent in American life, it became difficult for strictly observant Jews to abide by the concept of isolating ‘kol ishah’ (a woman’s voice). By the 1930s, except for Orthodox shuls, women were sitting with men and intoned the prayers with the congregation. Women were also featured singers with the choir and often sang the solos.

In 1955, a child named Betty Robbins persuaded her cantor to allow her to sing in the boys’ choir. She was later appointed Cantor of Temple Avodah in Oceanside, New York and was thought to be the first woman cantor of record. Hebrew Union College’s School of Sacred Music was established in 1947 as the first training school for cantors in this country. It preceded the acceptance of women rabbis which didn’t occur until 1968.

Barbara Otsfeld-Horowitz became the first woman cantor ordained at Hebrew Union College in 1975. She had grown up admiring the rabbis and cantors in her home town and had felt drawn to ministerial work. Although no woman before her had attempted to apply for cantorial ordination, she never the less applied and was accepted. There she studied both traditional and reform liturgical music services. Upon her twentieth anniversary at a pulpit in Buffalo, NY she remarked “Women cantors have altered the way in which prayer is offered, heard, and received.”

Today we know of one other pioneer whose name, prior to 2014, had been lost to history. On September 19, 1884, Julie Rosewald began her tenure at Temple Emanu-El in San Francisco, California. When this was discovered it marked what we now know is the first female cantor in American history. Rosewald had been an acclaimed opera star and descended from a line of cantors including her father and grandfather who were hazzans in Germany. Her mother sent her to the United States in 1865 and began performing with her sister and soon-to-be husband. Rosewald and her husband made their way to San Francisco in their later years due to the temperate climate and relatively large Jewish population. Although her intention was to open a music conservatory, when the local cantor who had been serving the primary reform synagogue in the city died, Rosewald was asked to step in. She continued to serve the congregation for 9 years until her retirement.

Today women comprise more than half of the ordained cantors graduating from Hebrew Union College and even more are being invested and certified in other schools of sacred music around the country. I’m grateful to these pioneering women whose shoulders I stand upon today.


Something You Might Not Know – Carol Klein (from Murray Siegel)

When our ancestors reached the shores of the U.S. they were hopeful of realizing the American dream, if not for themselves then for their children and grandchildren. Carol Joan Klein was born in a middle-class neighborhood in Brooklyn in 1942. Her parents were the children of immigrants, who hoped their daughter would realize the American dream.

At age four, Carol could play the piano by ear. Soon she found an all-encompassing interest in music. While at James Madison H.S., she formed a girl group and named it the “Co-sines” after a word she found in her algebra/trig text. She went to Queens College where she dated Neil Sedaka, whose 1959 hit “Oh! Carol” was about her. She met Gerry Goffin at Queens and they were married in a Jewish ceremony on Long Island.

They were a song-writing team, with Gerry writing the lyrics and Carol the melody. Their first big hit was “Will You Love Me Tomorrow” by the Shirelles, the first #1 hit by a black girl singing group. The Goffins quickly had two daughters and the girls’ babysitter was Eva Boyd, who, as Little Eva, recorded their song “Locomotion”. In 1968, Carol and Gerry divorced and she moved to California to pursue a singing career. In 1971 she produced an album which eventually sold more than 25,000,000 copies.

Carol was elected to the Songwriters’ and Rock and Roll Halls of Fame. She was the first female to receive the Gershwin Prize and was a Kennedy Center Honoree in 2015. She was awarded a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. Obviously, Carol Joan Klein realized the American dream to a maximal extent, yet you say that you never heard of her. Perhaps it would help to know that Carol changed her name to Carole King while still in high school. A Jewish girl from Brooklyn became an American icon.



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


