And yes, there is another New Year!

No matter how we calculate the passage of time, whether we consider the first of January or the first of Tishrei (Rosh Hashanah) as the New Year, the beginning of a year is always a time to pause, to reflect, to contemplate.

Tishrei (Rosh Hashanah) represents a rededication of our spiritual self. January is designed to give us a chance to think of our relationships. Then there is Tu B'Shvat, the New Year of the trees, and Passover, the New Year of our birth as a nation and a people – our religious maturity, if you will.

All can be summed up with a favorite quote from the rabbis of Yavneh (a city in Israel that produced a Rabbinical Academy after the destruction of the Temple in 70 AD): "I am a creation of God, and my neighbor is also a creation of God; my work is in the city and his in the field; I rise early to do my work and he rises early to do his. As he cannot do well at my work; similarly, I cannot do well at his work."

Nevertheless, if you say, "I do great things and he does unimportant things," perhaps we should respond: "We have learned that it does not matter if a person does much or little, but only if he directs his heart to heaven."

Perhaps what the rabbis of Yavneh were trying to say is that we need to care about each other, to be concerned about one another. This is the essence of who we are – our character – our respect for the dignity of all humans and animals as well.

All who toil in this vineyard of caring exemplify these teachings.

How do we accomplish this during everyday living? Quite simply by being who we are – human beings created to

imitate the goodness of God. And each New Year that is celebrated, secular or religious, gives us the opportunity to rededicate ourselves to doing for others.

Yes, we have a New Year for trees because we know that nature and humankind work together to make life livable and rewarding. Just as the trees sleep in the winter and are reborn in the spring, we too can garner our strength to bring renewal to our existence after the cold winter has passed.

February also reminds us of our obligations to those in need. This is why the Jewish Free Loan Associations throughout the world were created. We are taught that maintaining a person's dignity is paramount in our relationships with one another. There is such an organization in Phoenix – The Jewish Free Loan of Phoenix – and it has existed for quite some time.

As a past president of this worthy effort, I saw firsthand the needs and responses to those needs that gave a future and a hope to so many. The mitzvah is not alone in the giving or in the lending, but also in the way we respond to the need.

A tale is told about a person deep in prayer with a plea to God to send someone to eradicate hunger and poverty and death and destruction. He shouts to God to send someone to relieve the suffering. And then there is a voice that whispers and says that someone was sent – YOU! 🙏

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

HAYM SALOMON

The latest Ken Burns documentary series, “The American Revolution,” certainly lived up to expectations. Some characters portrayed, such as Washington, Franklin and Lafayette, were familiar; others were not. These included teenagers, women, Native Americans and African Americans. One glaring omission was Haym Salomon, who donated his entire fortune to the Patriot cause.

Haym was born in Leszno, Poland, was educated in Western Europe and emigrated to New York in 1775. He became involved in the Patriot cause, joined the Sons of Liberty and helped gather financial assistance for the American cause. As a member of the Sons of Liberty, he spied on the British and was arrested twice — the second time he was sentenced to execution but escaped.

He settled in Philadelphia and was involved in the Jewish community there. Haym joined Congregation Mikveh Israel, and in 1782 made the largest individual donation toward the construction of its main building. In 1783, Salomon got involved in the successful effort to have the Pennsylvania Council of Censors remove the



religious test oath required for office-holding under the State Constitution.

Haym died in 1785. He was totally bankrupt because the new American government did not pay back a penny of the monies he had loaned the Continental Congress. In 1939 Warner Brothers produced a short film called “Sons of Liberty” with Claude Rains playing Haym. In May 1943, a Liberty ship, the SS Haym Salomon, was launched. In 1975, the U.S. Post Office issued a commemorative stamp honoring Haym’s contribution to the success of the Revolution.

LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

JNS ARTICLE REFLECTS ISRAEL'S LOVE OF LONE SOLDIERS

IDF 'deeply values' its some 7,000 'Lone Soldiers'

Some 7,000 “lone soldiers” are serving in the Israel Defense Forces, including about half who immigrated to the Jewish state specifically to enlist, according to official figures released on Monday. About one-third of these soldiers — service members who do not have immediate family in Israel—are serving in combat units, an Israeli military official told JNS.

Last year, 1,050 lone soldiers from Jewish communities in the Diaspora enlisted in the IDF, including 33% from the United States, 14% from France, 13% from Russia, 6% from Ukraine, 3% from Australia, 1.2% from Germany and 0.6% from Spain. The number of lone soldiers has remained stable over the past several years, with a slight increase during the first year of the war sparked by the Hamas-led Oct. 7, 2023 massacre, the official said.

The length of their service depends on both age and the type of program in which they enlist and can range from shortened service to full military service for both men



and women. “We are committed to ensuring that no lone soldier ever stands alone,” Maj. Lior Peretz Sheleg, head of the IDF’s Lone Soldiers Section, Personnel Directorate, told JNS. “We deeply value their meaningful contribution to the success of the war, as well as the values they and their families embody, and recognize the very profound challenges faced by parents living continents away from their children.”

Michelle Jameson, U.S. Vets, Executive Director, will address the issues facing veterans experiencing homelessness at the Jewish War Veterans Copper State Post 619 meeting Sunday, February 22 in Ballroom A, Oakwood Country Club, 24218 South Oakwood Boulevard, Sun Lakes.

Complimentary lox, bagels, donuts, and coffee will be served at 9:30 am, with speaker at 10 am.

JWV's much-loved coffee drive, which means the world to the veterans who love their coffee, will culminate at this meeting. Anyone wishing to donate a can of regular ground coffee, may bring it to the February 22 meeting at the above location between 8:45-9:30 am.

This year, JWV Post 619 reached out to its many partners to participate in the campaign. Organizations collecting cans of coffee for U.S. VETS are JWV Posts 619 and 210; Sun Lakes Jewish Congregation; E. Valley JCC; Gila Butte Chapter, NSDAR; VFW Auxiliary #1433; Army Women United #68; American Legion Post 64; ARC Support the Troops; and Veterans Affinity.

Michelle will talk about U.S. VETS programming, issues facing veterans experiencing homelessness and changes in homeless services. Their mission is to empower veterans and families through housing, comprehensive services, and advocacy with the goal that all veterans and their families shall have their needs met to regain and maintain independence.

U.S. Vets and JWV have a long, outstanding relationship. According to Michelle, "Over the years, JWV has stood by U.S. VETS Phoenix in every way possible: providing

financial support during critical moments, hosting countless on-site BBQs and special events for our veterans. JWV is not just a partner—JWV is family to U.S. VETS, and their support has made a profound and lasting difference in the lives of the veterans we proudly serve and to me."

U.S. VETS-Phoenix has served thousands of veterans since opening in 2001. Last year alone, Phoenix provided 51,841 nights of housing, 116,642 meals, 9,888 mental health assessments, 276 job placements, and a successful move of 551 veterans into permanent homes.

They recently transitioned into a larger facility, the M.D. Hawkins Veterans Center in Phoenix, where JWV provided lunch to the veterans on moving day. The new facility has 142 beds of Transitional Housing, where veterans receive case management, behavioral health counseling, substance-use support, and workforce development to help them become independent.

Michelle Jameson is an accomplished nonprofit executive with more than two decades of experience leading mission-driven organizations through transformational growth. As the Executive Director of U.S. VETS Phoenix, she oversees the entire facility and its programs, serving hundreds of veterans each day. Under her leadership, the program has expanded significantly in both size and impact. Michelle brings deep expertise in governance, strategic planning, program design, and risk management.

JWV Post 619, which meets the third Sunday of every month from September to June, boasts members who represent a wide range of religious affiliations and participates in philanthropic activities to help veterans of all faiths. BAXTER WALTER WYATT GRADUATES



This was not an ordinary weekend. It was graduation day for Baxter Walter Wyatt, a three-year-old rescue with a year's worth of training that would qualify him to be a service dog to Julian Wyatt, Commander of Jewish War Veterans Copper State Post 619.

The ceremony was sponsored by and took place at the headquarters of "Soldier's Best Friend," a nonprofit organization that focuses on providing service dogs to U.S. military veterans suffering from PTSD, traumatic brain injury, and other physical and psychological challenges.

The mission of the organization is to improve the quality of life for these veterans by pairing them with trained service dogs to help alleviate symptoms and provide companionship. The program not only helps veterans regain independence and confidence but also promotes the adoption of shelter dogs. This gives the animals a purpose and a home while saving two lives at once, the veteran and the dog.

Though Julian had previously owned emotional support dogs over his 30-year military career, he now felt it was time to get a service dog to help with balance, anxiety, crowd control, companionship, and emotional support. It took over five months on a waiting list for a friend of his who worked at a shelter to find the right dog for Julian. On October 18, 2024, Baxter became a member of the Wyatt family — Julian, Lisa, and cats Boris and Asha.

Then began a year of intensive one-hour training periods two days a week with Soldier's Best Friend trainer, Pam Beasley, who has an innovative approach to teaching. Every Monday, Baxter and Jules met Pam at East Valley

K-9 Services for an indoor training session prepared Baxter for several tests to obtain his certificate. "We

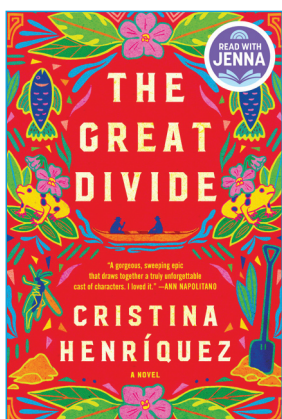
trained alongside other veterans with their dogs. We all bonded and grew together as a team," explains Wyatt. They even had airport jump seats in the training room, balance bars, and things for indoor training. Every Wednesday was devoted to social outings such as Home Depot, Fry's, the shopping mall, the barber shop, and restaurants.

"I learned so much about myself during this training right alongside Baxter," confesses Julian. "I opened up, became more like my old self before combat and have fallen in love with my life again. That's what Baxter and this program have done for me," he happily concluded.
