

This month we will, as have done the generations before, commemorate two events that are connected in many ways:

The traditional Veterans Day holiday is a time set aside to pay tribute to the men and women who have

served and currently serve our country through military service. Ever since the War of Independence, our citizens have understood the need to be ready to defend and protect our rights and liberties.

WRITE TO A LONE SOLDIER ELECTRONICALLY THIS YEAR



AN EDUCATION GOVERNOR

Matt Meyer was inaugurated as Governor of Delaware in January of this year, and he is a true education governor. There are two facts you should know about Matt. Prior to his political career, he taught seventh and eighth grade mathematics and he is Jewish.

Matt was born in Michigan, raised in Delaware and is a graduate of Brown University, majoring in political science and computer science. He joined Teach for America, an organization that accepts college graduates who have not been prepared to teach, and trains them to become classroom teachers. Once completing the TFA program, trainees are assigned to teach in a rural or inner-city school. Matt taught three years in a public school in Washington, DC and then taught at Prestige Academy in Wilmington, DE. He understands the difference between an under-resourced school and a school with high expectations.

After receiving a law degree, Matt worked as an attorney in various positions, including as an advisor to the State Department in Iraq. He began his political career in 2016, being elected as the New Castle County Executive and, in 2020, was re-elected to that office. In 2024. Matt won the election for Governor of Delaware.

JWV SPEAKER OFFERS HELP TO BRAIN INJURED VETS AND PUBLIC

More than 45.000 people in Arizona are living with a traumatic brain injury. Luke Fadell, Director of Veteran Services for the Brain Injury Association of Arizona (BIAZZ), will address Jewish War Veterans Copper State Post 619 on Sunday, November 16, in the Oakwood Clubhouse Ballroom, 24218 S Oakwood Blvd, Sun Lakes, at

10 am. Lox, bagels, donuts, and coffee will be served at 9:30 am. The public is welcome.

"Brain injury is a monumental obstacle in anyone's life. Too often, common brain injury symptoms are part of combat-related PTSD and struggles with addiction," according to the BIAZZ Director Fadell, a U.S. Army Desert Storm veteran. BIAZZ is dedicated to supporting all veterans and their families statewide who are striving to live well after experiencing service-connected or post-deployment brain injuries and trauma. This is accomplished by connecting them with the Brain Injury Association's approved neuro-provider database, alongside the VA, healthcare providers, and human service organizations. Support for service members caring for a parent or child with a brain injury is also provided.

The Brain Injury Association of Arizona helps survivors with all types of brain injury, whether from an accident or acquired, as in cases of drug overdose or severe illness. The work has directly improved the lives of thousands of survivors of brain injury, their loved ones, and caregivers by helping them rebuild rich lives with accessible social events and support groups. Their work has gotten brain injury survivors off the streets and into homes and out of rehabilitation centers and back into the workforce.

BIAZZ's Client Emergency Assistance Fund is used to close vital gaps in care and support that insurance or other resources won't cover, such as transportation, food for their pet family, internet access to keep job searches active, or other needs that simply aren't covered elsewhere. "Recently, I helped a veteran who had been experiencing several months of homelessness get back home to Manilla in the Philippines so he could reconnect with his family and support network," proudly explains Fadell. "This entailed finding necessary documentation, helping him get cleared for international travel and gaining funding for a place to settle in Manila."

Fadell holds certifications in ASIST (Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training), Peer Support, and Traumatic Brain Injury. He serves as the Board Chair for the Phoenix VA Mental Health Advocacy Council and is a member of the Phoenix VA Veteran Family Advisory Council and the Southern Arizona VA Veteran Mental Health Advocacy Council.






