



SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

THE X TROOP

For many centuries, little regard was paid to Jewish military prowess or courage displayed in combat. That changed with the onset of World War II. The British

Army formed the Palestinian Regiment, comprised of Palestinian Arabs and Jews who fought in North Africa against the Germans. As the regiment expanded, a Jewish Brigade was formed which fought in battles in Europe in 1944 and 1945.

Then there was the heroism of those Jews who rebelled against the Nazis in the Warsaw ghetto. Outmanned and with lesser weapons, these ghetto occupants used guerilla tactics to frustrate the German Army units. Their success forced the German High Command to transfer units from the Eastern Front to Warsaw. These additional troops soon quashed the ghetto rebellion, but there

was no question about the courage displayed by the Jewish fighters.


The U.S. Army had the Ritchie Boys, who were Germanspeaking immigrants, many of whom were Jewish and

trained in counterintelligence. Their fluency in German and their knowledge of German culture gave them tools to use when interrogating captured German soldiers

> or local civilians. A recent "60 Minutes" segment highlighted the accomplishments of the Ritchie Boys.

One group of Jewish soldiers, known as The X Troop, was comprised of young lewish men who had escaped from Austria and Germany to England. When the War started, they were treated as aliens and locked up in internment camps. Somebody realized that they could be assets in the fight against Germany since they understood the language and the people. Unlike the Ritchie Boys, these troops were trained in interrogation techniques and in commando combat. They were both soldiers and counterintelligence operatives.

Their heroism was a secret until the book by Leah Garrett, X Troop: The Secret Jewish Commandos of World War II, was published in May of 2021.



LONE SOLDIER PROJECT HANUKKAH GREETING CAMPAIGN


