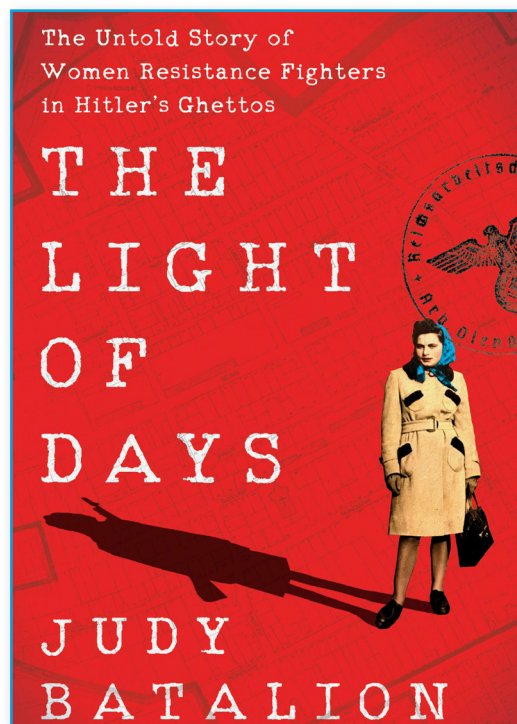

Please watch your email for information about Chick Flicks, our Movie group. The dates and movies vary each month, but include a discussion of the film via Zoom.

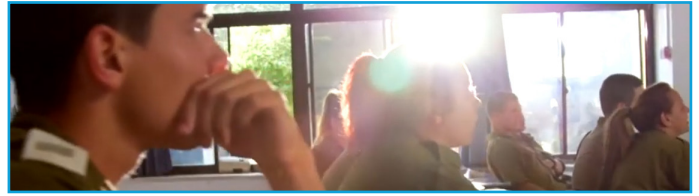


LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

NATIV — THE NATIONAL CENTER FOR JEWISH STUDIES AND CONVERSION

Lone Soldier Milena Gershkowitz was born in Belarus to a Jewish father and Catholic mother and wore a crucifix until her parents divorced. She and her father, with his family, then moved to Israel. Visiting Israeli relatives, she became familiar with Jewish customs but still felt disconnected to her Jewish ancestry. In 10th grade, she thought about converting to Judaism for the first time. During her army enlistment she heard about and entered the Nativ program. After Nativ, she enrolled in their conversion course resulting in her conversion to Judaism. She said, "We all have a role to play in our collective Jewish experience."

About 3,500 non-Israelis from 80 different countries serve in the IDF after having made *aliyah* to become Israeli citizens under the 1950 Law of Return. This law gives all Jews, people of Jewish ancestry (with at least one Jewish grandparent) and their spouses the right to immigrate, settle in Israel and become Israeli citizens and obliges Israel, through the Jewish Agency, to facilitate their immigration.



Have all these young adults been raised in Jewish families, participated in Jewish culture, traditions and rituals? The answer is NO! The Jewish Agency created NATIV in 1999 to address this concern. A 4-1/2-week identity-building program of learning, traveling around Israel, and experiencing holidays and Shabbat with a family connects these Lone Soldiers from the Former Soviet Union, as they participate in the program.

After completing this aspect of Nativ, many Lone Soldiers choose to pursue an optional conversion course. These Orthodox conversions, controlled by the military rabbinate, are the only recognized conversion options that are not run by the Orthodox Chief Rabbinate of Israel. However, more than 10,000 (one resource said 20,000) soldiers have been converted via Nativ. These conversions, just like many completed outside of Israel, are criticized by the Chief Rabbinate.

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

FOUR U.S. SENATORS *By Murray Siegel*



The men and women who have served in the U.S. Senate are an interesting and diverse group. From 2007 through 2009, there were three senators who represented three different states, had three different party affiliations, and

presented three different political perspectives. Yet these three men shared a few significant characteristics.

Chuck Schumer entered the Senate in 1999, representing New York as a Democrat and an avowed liberal. Norm Coleman was a conservative Republican from Minnesota who took his seat in 2003. In 2007, Bernie Sanders, an Independent who usually caucuses with the Democrats, became a senator from Vermont. He is a democratic socialist.

They were quite different, so you may ask, "What did they have in common?" All three are Jewish and had grandparents who immigrated from Eastern Europe. If you do not think that Coleman is a common Jewish family name, the truth is that the family name was changed from Goldman to Coleman to be "more American."

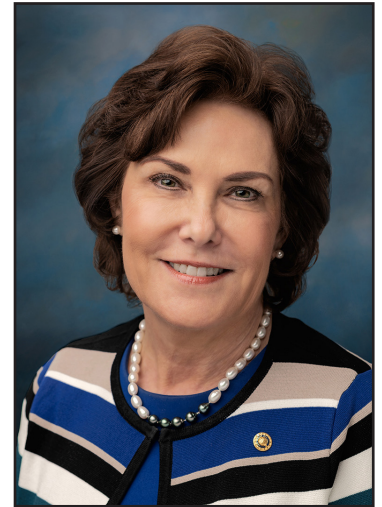


More than belonging to the same religion, these three Senators all are graduates of the same high school: James Madison H.S. in Brooklyn, NY. Madison is located in a middle class Jewish neighborhood and is known for its academic excellence. Two women who are graduates of Madison should be familiar to you: Ruth Bader and Carole Klein, better known as the late Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg and award-winning singer-songwriter Carole King.

A Fourth Senator

Can you name a senator who is both a technology expert and was a synagogue president? Her name is Jacky Rosen, junior Democratic senator from Nevada. Jacky worked in the IT business and owned a technology consulting firm. She was also president of Congregation Ner Tamid, a Reform synagogue in Henderson, NV.

Jacklyn Sheryl Spektor was born in Chicago and moved with her parents to Las Vegas after college. She is married to Dr. Larry Rosen, a radiologist, and they have one daughter. Jacky served in the U.S. House prior to winning the Senate seat. She bases her positions on information rather than ideology — she has been called both a liberal and a moderate. She claims that she entered politics responding to *tikkun olam*. (In Reform Judaism, it is an aspiration to behave and act constructively and beneficially.)



Jacky Rosen serves on the Armed Services Committee, the Committee on Science, Space, and Technology, and is a member of the bipartisan Problem Solvers' Caucus.

SOMETHING ELSE YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

UKRAINE *By Murray Siegel*

Ukraine has often been in the news in recent years, first with the phone call that led to an impeachment, followed by Russia's attempts to intimidate Ukraine and its democracy. Yet, why should Jews be seriously interested in this country? There are two reasons.

American Jews whose ancestors came to the U.S. from 1880 to 1920 will say that their family came from Galicia, Poland, or Russia, yet on today's map it is likely that the towns from which they left are in Ukraine. My own family history is a good example. My mother's parents eloped from Lemberg, in Galicia (Eastern Austria-Hungary), and arrived in NYC. Lemberg, a seat of Jewish culture, became Lvov, a city in Poland after World War I. The city is now called Lviv and is in Ukraine. The Golden Rose Synagogue, known also as the Nachmanowicz Synagogue, or the Turei Zahav Synagogue built in 1581, is an active Orthodox synagogue in Lviv.

My father was born in Ostrog in Russia and immigrated to NYC as a young child with his family. That Russian city is now called Ostroh and is in Ukraine. All eight of my great-grandparents are buried in Ukraine.

The current democratically elected president of Ukraine is Volodymyr Zelensky. Besides being a lawyer and a comedian, he is Jewish. The U.S. Army officer who reported the questionable phone call between Zelensky and President Trump is Lt. Col. Alexander Vindman, born in Ukraine to Jewish parents, before immigrating to Brooklyn with his family. In July 2020, Vindman retired after 21 years in the military. He cited vengeful behavior and bullying by President Trump and administration officials after he complied with a subpoena to testify in front of Congress during Trump's impeachment hearings. At the time of his retirement, Vindman's promotion to the rank of colonel had been abnormally stalled by the administration.

So, whether you, too, can trace your ancestry to Ukraine or you are concerned about how what is happening there affects our nation, as a Jew you should want to pay close attention to Ukraine.

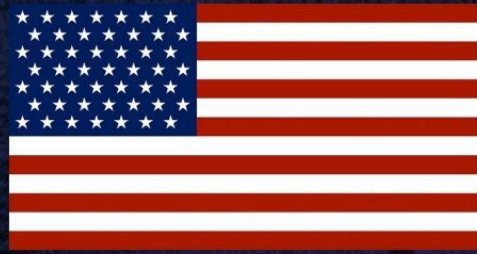

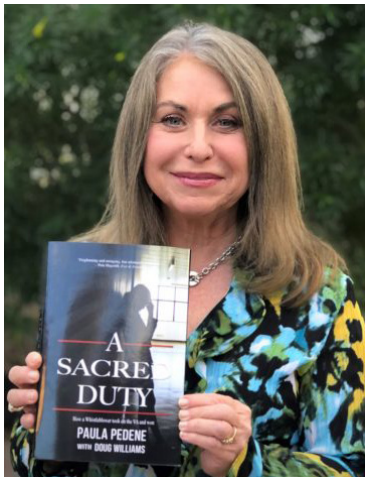

HEROIC VA WHISTLEBLOWER & AUTHOR PAULA PEDENE

Jewish War Veterans Copper State Post 619 welcomes speaker Paula Pedene, author of *A Sacred Duty*, based on how faith, perseverance, and grit were able to help her win her Whistleblower Case against the Phoenix Veterans Affairs (VA) Health Care System. The meeting is open to the entire community.

Principal of Paula Pedene & Associates public relations, Pedene is the Veterans' Voice columnist for the *Arizona Republic* and an Ethics Advocate, serving on the Board of Ethics and Professional Standards. She is a decorated U.S. Navy Veteran with military service during both the Cold War and Operation Desert Storm. After transitioning from the Navy as a journalist, she became an award-winning Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) public relations practitioner.

Don't miss this opportunity to hear Pedene share how she became one of the first whistleblowers at the Phoenix VA. After new leaders came in, they punished

her for her whistleblowing activities by removing her from her high-profile public relations position and banishing her to the basement library as a clerk.

While in the basement, Pedene became aware of the Phoenix VA wait-time scandal. She worked anonymously for a year trying to expose the illegal activities. The eventual fallout from the disgraceful treatment of veterans and others eventually led to the resignation of the Secretary of Veterans Affairs. Today, Phoenix Veterans can breathe easier knowing that the system has been completely overhauled.
