We have to talk about money.

The Board of Directors, based on the recommendations of the Finance Committee, just approved our budget for fiscal year 2021-2022. Although we experienced strange and unexpected events this past year, dues will remain the same for the coming year. That will be \$175 per person. Sadly, our membership has dwindled in recent years due to death or serious illness. The income side of our budget suffers accordingly.

The budget also predicts a significant deficit for the first time. In the past, per BOD and Finance Committee decisions, we have been authorized to dip into our reserve funds up to \$5,000 per year. While we thought we might have to do so in previous fiscal years, we have been able to generate more income than predicted while at the same time to cut more expenses than expected. Thus far, our reserve funds have remained intact.

However, rising costs and unexpected expenses this past year (i.e. Wi-Fi licensing and monthly costs for Wi-Fi availability to enable YouTube services, higher costs for additional musical support, higher costs for audio/visual technicians, etc.) have contributed to a higher bottom line on expenses. Most of the elements of our budget (on the expense side) are fixed or contracted costs like salaries, rent, insurance, postage, and the like. Therefore, they cannot be changed. Those costs that make up the small remainder of



our expenses we have pared back as far as possible to still provide the monthly, holiday, and congregational services that make us who we are. We don't anticipate much, if any, cost-cutting.

While dues remain static this year, we are appealing to those of you who can and are willing to make an additional donation to your dues statement. Any extra income we receive will directly help our bottom line. In the past, your generosity has made a big difference. Any additional contributions you make to our General Fund (which is unrestricted) make a huge difference in us being able to retain as much as possible in our reserve funds. No organization can function without an emergency reserve fund, and we are no exception.

This month, you will receive a dues invoice along with a printout of the personal information you have given us in the past. Please be sure to correct any information that is out of date or, in the case of yahrzeits, that you have to add. Later in the summer — most likely in August — you will receive your High Holiday tickets.

We wish you a happy summer and look forward to seeing many of you in person at summer Twilight Services, on July 9 and August 13. Masks and social distancing will be the norm. Our last special Twilight Service is scheduled for Friday, June 25 via Zoom. All of these services will begin at 5:30

p.m. Please note that Rosh Hashanah begins on Labor Day, Monday evening, September 6th, and unless the CDC suggests otherwise, SLJC services (like most synagogues around the country) will be live and in person at the Chapel. As of now, masks will still be required.

Please stay well, and if you haven't done so yet, get your COVID vaccinations!

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Pa, Ze'ev, Joseph ... and me

I've never physically been to Odessa, Ukraine, although I've been there a thousand times in my mind. My grandfather, David (Pa) Hakman, my mother's father, was born and grew up there. He was the one who ignited in me my love for history. I loved him dearly. I still do. He was a "tin-knocker" – he worked with sheet metal in his little shop down the street and he would build containers of all sizes and shapes that he sold. I still have one which I keep in my **Pa Hakman** studio. I never put anything in

it. It's there as a reminder of the times we shared at his shop.

When he was growing up in the 1890's, it was a turbulent time. Russian society was in ferment and there was much talk and many acts of rebellion and provocation against the centuries-old czarist regime that enforced a virtual serf society on the countryside. There were also pogroms and other constant anti-Semitic violence perpetrated on Jewish communities. In fact, he was once caught up in a disturbance in which he was hit in the head by a mounted soldier and, as a result, carried a steel plate in his skull for the rest of his life.

He was an ardent follower of Vladimir (Ze'ev) Jabotinsky, the fiery journalist and Zionist activist who established the Jewish Self-Defense Organization, a Jewish militant group, to help safeguard Jewish communities throughout Russia. Pa and I spoke quite often of the part he and another Russian Jew, Joseph Trumpledor, played in the formation of what would eventually become the Israeli Defence Force, or the IDF. Ze'ev Jabotinsky

During World War 1, Jabotinsky had the idea of establishing a Jewish Legion to fight alongside the British against the Ottomans who then controlled Palestine. In 1915, together with Trumpeldor, a one-armed decorated



veteran (in fact, the most highly decorated Jew in the Russian army, awarded the cross of St. George) of the Russo-Japanese War, created the Zion Mule Corps, which consisted of several hundred Jewish men, mainly Russians, who had been exiled from Palestine by the Ottoman Empire and had settled in Egypt. This unit, considered to be the first all-Jewish military unit organized in close to two thousand years, and the ideological beginning of the Israel Defense Forces, served with distinction in the Battle of Gallipoli. Trumpledor was again wounded there.

When the Zion Mule Corps was disbanded, Jabotinsky traveled to London, where he continued his efforts

Joseph Trumpledor to establish Jewish units to fight in Palestine as part of the British Army. Although he did not serve with the Zion Mule Corps, Jabotinsky and 120 Zion Mule Corps members did serve in the London Regiment. In 1917, the government agreed to establish three Jewish battalions, initiating the Jewish Legion. As an honorary lieutenant in the 38th Royal Fusiliers, Jabotinsky saw action in Palestine in 1918. His battalion was one of the first to enter Transjordan (present day Jordan). In 1919, he was appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) for his service.

In 1917, Trumpeldor returned to Russia in order to convince the Provisional Government (Lenin had taken Russia out of World War 1) to form a Jewish regiment in the Russian army. Additionally he organised Jews to defend themselves and established the HeHalutz in Russia, a youth organization that prepared immigrants for aliyah. He then returned to Palestine himself.

In the years just after the close of World War 1, the political situation in the region remained explosive. Gangs of clanbased border peasants, combining politics and banditry, were active around the loosely defined borders between the soon-to-be British Mandate of Palestine, the French Mandate of Lebanon and of Syria.

At Tel Hai, one of four Jewish farming villages at the northern end of the Upper Galilee's Hulah Valley, in March of 1920, there was a misunderstanding between neighboring Shiites and the farmers that erupted into an armed confrontation. Joseph Trumpledor was killed in the following firefight and was buried with eight of his fellow farmers.

That same year, Ze'ev Jabotinsky was elected to the first Assembly of Representatives in Palestine. The following year he was elected to the executive council of the Zionist Organization. He left the mainstream Zionist movement in 1923 due to differences of opinion between him and its chairman, Chaim Weizmann, establishing a new revisionist party called Alliance of Revisionists Zionists and its youth movement, BETAR (a Hebrew acronym for the "League of Joseph Trumpeldor").

Jabotinsky died of a heart attack on August 3, 1940, while he was visiting a Jewish self-defense camp in Hunter, New York that was run by BETAR. Ze'ev Jabotinsky rests on Mt. Herzl. Joseph Trumpledor remains buried where he fell at Tel Hai and is memorialized annually in Israel on the 11th day of Adar.

Ze'ev Jabotinsky and Joseph Trumpledor were, and still are, the founding flame of the IDF, the sword and shield of

past, present and future.

I thank my grandfather for telling me their story.
